Course Description	The purpose of this course is to enhance the ability of medical students/future physicians to appropriately address ethical issues arising within patient care of those experiencing end-of-life interventions.			
Course Objectives	 Explore the meaning of death and dying, both personally and professionally, for self and others. Describe the variability of the meaning of death and dying relative to the medical professional role and that of others. Evaluate relevant policies and legal statutes pertaining to end-of-life interventions across the life span. Appraise ethical issues arising in contemporary end-of-life medical interventions including autonomy and competing or complimentary values. Demonstrate the ability to assess those experiencing end-of-life and to formulate culturally competent interventions which address ethical issues that arise. 			
Course Activities	Students in this course will complete a series of assigned readings cover the following content areas: Cultural Mean of Death (Self and Other); Professional Role in the Dying Process; Policies and Legal Issues in the Dying Process& Death; Contemporary Ethical Issues at End of Life; Formulating Ethical and Legal Medical Interventions at End of Life. All assigned readings will be available online.
