Visiting Student Acting Internship in Emergency Medicine/Internal Medicine

Course Description	This course will provide non-BSOM students an immersive experience in the combined disciplines of Emergency Medicine and Internal Medicine (EM/IM). This course is designed for a student interested in pursuing an EM/IM residency. It includes primary exposure to the broad spectrum of acute care, medical/surgical emergencies, the emergent management of critically ill/injured patients in the Emergency Department. It also will expose students to the care of critically ill patients admitted to the medical intensive care units and the general internal medicine service.

	 Students will spend a 28-day clinical rotation in the ECU/Vidant Medical Center. Two weeks in the Emergency Department where they will have primary responsibility of evaluating and caring for ED patients under the supervision of ECU Emergency Medicine Faculty. Students will also spend two weeks on inpatient teams caring for patients in the medical intensive care units and/or the inpatient GIM service. 					
Course Activities	 Students will participate in weekly resident conferences as well as simulated patient encounters in the ECU simulation lab. 					
	 Students will present one or more evidence-based PowerPoint presentation(s). 					
	 Students will do one patient follow-up project using the medical literature to evaluate the care of a patient in the emergency department 					
	5) Problems/Chief complaints most commonly evaluated by students include: Chest pain, Shortness of breath, Abdominal Pain, Pediatric Fever, Trauma, Shock, Altered Mental Status, GI Bleeding, Headache, Seizure, Basic Toxicology, Burns, and Orthopedic Emergencies					
Course Schedule Requirements	8 clinical shifts in the VMC emergency department over the first 2 weeks. This will be followed by 2 weeks of inpatient medicine, at least one week will be spent with ECU EM/IM faculty in the medical intensive care units (MICU/CICU). A second inpatient week will be spent either on the general internal medicine service or the intensive care unit depending on availability. There is no call requirement. Estimated total weekly hours are 40/week for the EM weeks and 50/week for inpatient portion of the rotation.
